All monarchs migrate to a small region in Mexico every year to over-winter there. Monarch caterpillars feed exclusively on the leaves of milkweed, the only host plant for this iconic butterfly species. As such, milkweed is critical for the survival of monarchs. Without it, they cannot complete their life cycle and their populations decline.

Decreasing day length and temperatures, along with aging milkweed and nectar sources trigger a change in monarchs; this change signifies the beginning of the migratory generation. Unlike summer generations that live for two to six weeks as adults, adults in the migratory generation can live for up to nine months.

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The monarch butterfly uses the Hudson River Valley as a highway on its two-way migration from Mexico to America's East Coast. Milkweed disappeared rapidly in the late 1990s after farmers started planting herbicide-tolerant crops in the Upper Midwest, where studies have shown that more monarchs were produced per acre than in other habitats.

Fall - southerly migration Temperatures begin to drop, day length shortens, milkweed and nectar sources become sparse and the monarch realizes that it is time to head to Mexico.
